- In 2000 the "Don't suffer in silence" programme was introduced and, according to Professor Peter Smith of Goldsmith's College in London, it is now bringing results. It can, he estimates, reduce bullying by up to 50%, by applying a range of techniques.
- Some of this knowledge is surprising. According to Professor Smith bullies often do not conform to the popular stereotype of an unintelligent thug.
- They include some new and controversial elements such as bully courts, in which pupils themselves decide punishment for bullies, as well as a repertoire of established, tried and tested approaches.
- Well, in fact, some bullies at least are quite clever and socially skilled, but they're socially skilled in manipulative ways, in ways of organising a gang and choosing the best way to hurt someone and finding out ways to avoid being detected and so forth.
- To develop these strategies, psychologists like Professor Smith are for the first time applying scientific analysis to the phenomenon and its new area of research is already starting to provide a more sophisticated understanding of who bullies and why.
- So they're quite, actually, clever. Not all bullies, of course, but some bullies are quite like that, especially the ringleaders of gangs.
- Your picture of the bully might be one of the sort of misconceived ideas, actually, which tends to go around, that the bully is a sort of rather stupid, oafish kind of person.
